The co-hosts PAS, FPAN, UWF and AAS (Alabama Archaeological Society) enjoyed a very good response to this year's conference with 163 people attending. The setting in historic downtown Pensacola was a perfect place to gather. Group meetings and the welcome reception were held on Friday. On Saturday, 3 paper presentations ran consecu-

tively all day and poster sessions ran in the Museum of Commerce during the afternoon. The Destination Archaeology Resource Center at FPAN offered attendees a preview of 2 new exhibits opening later in May. The Saturday night awards banquet was held at Apple Annie's Courtyard . Dr. Judy Bense was the keynote speaker and, in addition, was awarded the FAS 2024 Lifetime Achievement Award. Jan Lloyd received the Ripley P. Bullen Memorial Award and John Furey received the William



C. Lazarus Award. St Augustine SAAA received the FAS chapter award this year. Thanks to all involved in planning, sponsoring, attending and volunteering to make this a successful meeting.

<u>**September 10**</u> "<u>Old Collections, New Stories: From Hawkshaw to You!</u>" Public Archaeology and Hawkshaw Exhibit at FPAN. How it evolved. The joy of volunteering: Perspectives and Archaeological Collections Care.

October 8 "Navigating Maroon Archaeology" The history of marronage in the USA is significant, but often overlooked. Lack of widespread recognition and heritage about marronage is attributed to histories downplayed or erased in historical records. What does exist across various archives requires significant effort to piece together. Archaeology plays a role in highlighting these maroon stories.

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November 12 "Florida's Creek Indians in the 1800's" Appearing and disappearing Creek Indians into the Florida Panhandle. Cultural survival on the run. A lesson in tenacious resilience.

December 10 "Hawkshaw: The Rest of the Story" The Hawkshaw project, a significant milestone in the development of public archaeology in Florida, was not only influential but also garnered significant recognition. The presentation will provide the background, context, and ripple effects of the Hawkshaw project.

Dr. Judy Bense founded the Anthropology and Archaeology programs at UWF including the Anthropology Dept., Archaeology Institute, and the Florida Public Archaeology Network. She served as UWF president from 2008 to 2017. Bense also chairs the Florida Historical Commission and has been inducted into the Florida Women's Hall of Fame.

2025

January 14 "Miraflores Burial Ground Study". Following the recovery of human remains at Miraflores Park, the City of Pensacola initiated the Miraflores Burial Ground Study to investigate a potential burial ground. A ground penetrating radar survey, funded by a National Park Service grant, identified 80 possible unmarked graves.

Adrianne Walker is the Historic Preservation Planner in Pensacola with a bachelor's degree in geoarchaeology and a master's degree in historical archaeology. She previously worked in cultural resource management for the UWF Historic Trust before joining the city.

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March 11 "UWF Archaeological Field School 2024 and 2025" Faculty from UWF, Dept. of Anthropology will present some results of recent fieldwork, including new excavations of EPIII, the third shipwreck of Tristan de Luna's 1559 settlement of Pensacola. Conservation of materials from EPIII has resulted in exciting new discoveries. The three archaeologists will also discuss plans for archaeological fieldwork in 2025.

April 8 "UWF Archaeology Institute Update on Downtown Archaeological Research" Archaeological evidence of the colonial forts of First Spanish San Miguel and the British Fort of Pensacola, the Second Spanish Government District, and the colonial and early American town have been documented across downtown. Recent research continues to derive meaningful information from our shared cultural resources in a constantly developing urban environment.

ARCHAEOLOGY IN FLORIDA LOST A COUPLE OF FRIENDS THIS SUMMER

Close to home here in Pensacola, John LeRoy passed away in June. He and his wife, Gail, have been members of PAS

for years and were always quick to volunteer for whatever jobs needed to be done. John served as several officers for PAS including President. They were very active when PAS hosted the FAS Annual Conference in Pensacola in 2009. They sat at the table at events for years telling everyone about PAS and local archaeological activities. We will all miss him.



Dr. Barbara Purdy, Professor Emerita in Anthropology at the University of Florida and Curator Emerita in Archaeology at the Florida Museum of Natural History, also passed away in June. In the 1970s Dr. Purdy discovered lithic remains that she interpreted as pre-Clovis cultural material, a perspective ahead of its time. She organized a wet site archaeological conference in 1986 that drew scholars from all over the world. In 2013 SEAC presented Barbara with a lifetime achievement award. The Florida Anthropological Society also recognized her with the FAS Lifetime Achievement Award in 2022.
