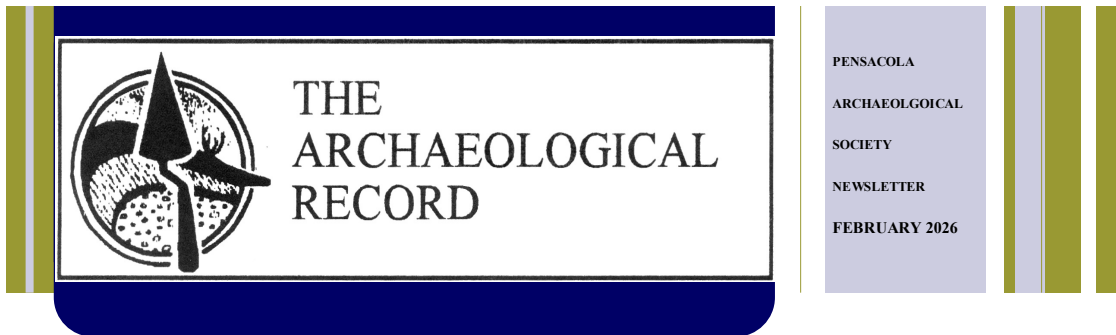

March 10 “UWF Archaeological Field School 2025” Faculty from UWF, Dept. of Anthropology will present results of recent fieldwork, including new excavations of EPIII, the third shipwreck of Tristan de Luna's 1559 settlement of Pensacola, resulted in exciting new discoveries. Dr. John Worth, Professor, Dr. John Bratten, Professor, Dr. Greg Cook, Assoc. Professor, and Dr. Ramie Gougeon, Professor & Anthropology Dept. Chair, UWF.

April 14 “The Epicenter of Escambia County Archaeology-It Ain't All in Pensacola” Neal Collier’s interest in archaeology began after reading a Water-Powered Mill Survey by UWF's John Phillips in the late 1980s. Getting involved was the beginning of many a merry chase into the forests, creeks and swamps of the area. Neal Collier is a student of local history. He was involved the founding of The Alger-Sullivan Historical Society, has written dozens of newspaper articles on local history, and was involved in publishing several books. He is a past officer and present Trustee of The Alger-Sullivan Historical Society.

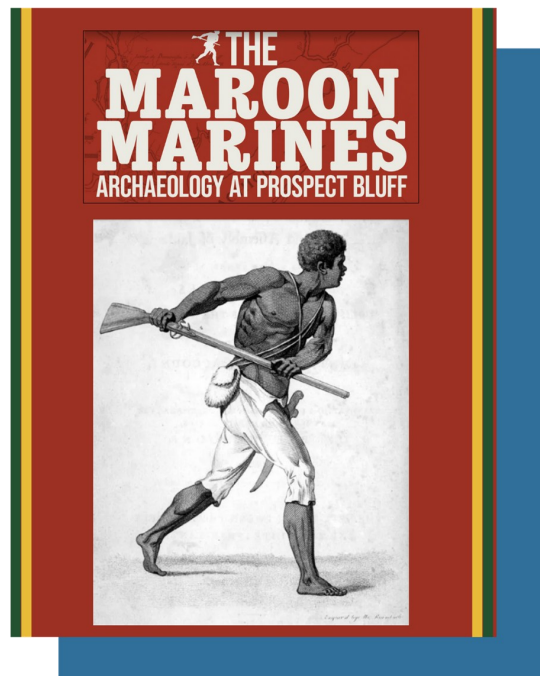
